





FTRF LAUNCHES BRAND LICENSING PROGRAM

Joe Davis recently reported at the Jan. 15th Board of Directors meeting that the FTRF's new Brand Licensing Program was already providing an important source of revenue to support the mission of the FTRF.

The program licenses companies who wish to use the FTRF brand logo trademark to market and sell endorsed products, which in turn generate a royalty payable to the FTRF. Cimarron Firearms Co. kicked off the licensing effort with the production and sale of a Texas Ranger Model P Single Action Revolver and a model 1876 Texas Ranger "Presidio" Short Rifle.

Most recently, Schaefer Outfitters of Ft. Worth began producing and marketing an exclusive Texas Ranger Brush Jacket. Over 325,000 Schafer Catalogs were shipped with Retired Texas Ranger Capt. Clete Buckaloo modeling the jacket appearing on the catalog's back cover. Ads have appeared in Texas Monthly magazine and other publications. All advertising notes that a portion of the sales are donated to support the construction of the Texas Rangers Heritage Center in Fredericksburg.

Leonard Bucsanyi, Foundation project officer, coordinates the program. "Licensed products are selected that enhance the brand image of the FTRF with the overall objective to establish and develop brand awareness. Assistance provided to licensees include FTRF trademark promotion, labeling, packaging and advertising to ensure quality control," according to Bucsanyi.

Joe Davis said "The brand licensing program not only generates additional funding to the FTRF, but informs the general public as to who we are which is invaluable. Royalties derived from the program go to support programs and services of the FTRF. As the program matures, we are expecting new companies to partner up with us and support the FTRF brand."

TEXAS IRON

GUNS OF THE TEXAS RANGERS

This story concerns two famous Texas Rangers and a gamblers gun. The Texas Rangers were Captains Frank A. Hamer and Charles F. Stevens. The gun was a small frame nickel plated Smith & Wesson .32 caliber revolver. The time frame for the story was the 1920s. This type revolver was often referred to as a Saturday night special because it was an easily concealed city gun and also due to its inexpensive cost. It was formerly known as a Smith & Wesson, hand ejector model 1903, second change in .32 S&W long caliber, serial # 57259. It is a nickel-plated 6 shot revolver with factory mother of pearl grips. It was refurbished sometime around 1917. The bottom of the grip frame has the name "C Stevens" engraved on it.

This revolver was obtained from the executor of the Stevens estate. The family had stated that it was given to Captain Stevens by this lifelong friend Captain Frank Hamer. Frank Hamer was said to have taken from a gambler during an early effort to clean up the Mexia, Texas oil fields. Captain Charles Stevens commanded Company G from 1918 to 1920 in Brownsville. He along with his entire company of Rangers was later reassigned to Marathon. This move was said to have been a result of Captain Stevens' harsh treatment of Mexican Americans along the lower border. He reenlisted as was the requirement for all Rangers resulting from the newly passed law of 20 June 1919. This law which was highly political in nature caught Frank Hamer by surprise and as a result of his inaction, he found himself without a Ranger job. Captain Stevens hearing of this hired Frank as a Private in his Company G in Marathon. Frank never forgot his appreciation to Captain Stevens and rose to the rank of Sergeant in Company G. It should be remembered that this was a time just shortly after the close of

World War I when the Ranger Service was still trying to adjust from the excessive buildup in the number of Rangers; many which were unqualified. Frank Hamer, however, was not finished with the Rangers. He drifted in and out of the Ranger service. From April 1920 to September 1921, he was in the U.S. Prohibition service. By 1922, he was again in Austin as a Captain commanding HQ Company: a position he held until November 1932.

Captain Stevens resigned from the Rangers as a result of his disgust with the political atmosphere in Austin. He accepted employment as a Deputy US Marshall and later as a Federal Prohibition Officer. He rose to the position of supervisor for all federal prohibition activities in the San Antonio and Houston areas. He was assassinated while returning from a prohibition raid on September 25, 1929, by bootleggers and died in Bexar County. During this time Captain Frank Hamer was conducting a later clean up in the Borger oil fields. Upon hearing of Captain Stevens's death, he halted operations and immediately headed to San Antonio where he served as an honorary pallbearer at Stevens' funeral.

My research on the provenance of this revolver was greatly aided by the information provided by my friend and historian for the Hamer family, Harrison Hamer of San Saba, Texas. Also, of assistance was John Boessenecker. Mr. Boessenecker is an authority on Frank Hamer and authored the recently released book "Texas Ranger, The Epic Life of Frank Hamer, The Man Who Killed Bonnie and Clyde", copyright 2016. It is an informative and well-written book.

I am satisfied that the above-referenced revolver was presented to Captain Stevens by Captain Frank

Hamer during their mutual visit to Houston, Texas. There is a period photo circa 1920's showing them walking together on a busy Houston street. If an inanimate object could talk I'm sure this Smith & Wesson revolver would have quite a story to tell.

Captain Stevens has had a controversial law enforcement career. As previously stated, many thought he was too harsh with his treatment of Mexican Americans, however, one must consider the atmosphere on the border at this time. Opinions are split as to whether he was a credit to the Rangers or not. I would place myself in his corner and believe him to be a positive example of the Texas Ranger legacy.

As for Captain Frank Hamer, he went on to be one of the most respected Texas Rangers and a legend not only in Texas but across the nation. The highlight of his career was the ambush killing of the famous bandit duo Bonnie Parker and Clyde Barrow on a deserted county road near Gibsland, Bienville Parish, Louisiana on 23 May 1934. Captain Hamer was not a Ranger at the time but was acting under the authority of a Texas Highway Patrolman's commission granted in part to the sponsorship of Lee Simmons, Director of the Texas Prison System. What is not widely known is the indispensable groundwork and initial planning that went into this ambush as a result of the efforts of Bienville Parish Sheriff Henderson Jordan. Ivy Methvin in coordination with Sheriff Jordan was acting as bait in the ambush in order to obtain a pardon for his son Henry. Henry Methvin was a Clyde Barrow accomplice and also a wanted criminal in the state of Texas.

But that's another story...

While efforts continue to progress for completing Phase II construction of the Texas Rangers Heritage Center, last year showed a remarkable increase in the visibility of the existing facility. In 2017, visitor attendance was up by 23% from 2016, with a 47% increase in gross income as well. The Texas Rangers Heritage Center is becoming a premier location for weddings, festivals, banquets, etc. with the amount of events more than doubling from 2016.

TEXAS RANGERS TALES

When the family and friends of George W. Moore stood at his grave side that day in 1886, they doubtless pondered the fundamental question that always comes to mind when a young person dies: Why did it have to happen?

Moore was only 28 when death came. But he had packed a lot of living in that short life, serving as a private in Company D of the Frontier Battalion under one of the most illustrious of the Texas Ranger captains, Dan W. Roberts. Not much is known about Moore—when he enlisted on March 1, 1877 records show he was 5 feet, 8 inches tall and had black hair—but under Roberts, his Ranger service would not have been boring. Death brought him one lasting distinction: He became the first of 37 one-time Texas Rangers to be buried in Kerr County's Center Point Cemetery.

Actually, there are probably 40 Ranger graves in the small cemetery, but Bobbie J. Powell—whose great-grandfather Robert J. Lange is one of the former Texas lawmen buried there—could only document thirty-two of the burials as the graves of former Rangers when she started doing research back in the 1980s. “I think there are at least three more who were Rangers, I just haven’t been able to prove it,” she said. (Also, one Ranger is known to be buried in the cemetery, but he does not have a marker and his exact location is unknown.)

Even if the grave count remains at 37, that number is unequaled anywhere else in Texas. No other cemetery in the state, not even the sprawling State Cemetery in Austin, is the final resting place of more former Rangers. “There’s no reason for it that we know of other than the men buried there were all from this area,” she said. “When I started my research, I knew the families of most of the Rangers.” Kinfolks of Ranger Moore certainly did their part to give the cemetery its unusual distinction. He would be the first of nine Moores with Ranger service buried in the cemetery.

The first settlers around what is now Center Point were Elizabeth Denton, her children and slaves. They took up homesteading in 1852, joined six years later by the family of Dr. Charles Ganahl. A native of Austria, he named the community Zanzenburg after his hometown. By 1872, enough people lived in and around Zanzenburg to justify calling it a town, though someone decided its bottom-of-the-alphabet name was not particularly fitting. What they came up with was a lot easier to pronounce, if much less exotic: Center Point.

Soon, in consideration of \$10, one acre was deeded to the Methodist Church for use as a cemetery and church site. In 1875, 80-year-old Lydia Burney was the first person buried there. Six years later, two more acres were added to the cemetery. The church was eventually moved off the property and additional land acquisitions in 1901 and 2001 brought the cemetery to its present 7-acre size. By the summer of 1987, when the Kerr County Historical Commission and the Center Point Sesquicentennial Committee dedicated a historical marker at the site, 1,452 graves had been located in the cemetery. Numerous pioneers and community leaders are buried there, including the 36 Rangers.

The second former Ranger buried in the cemetery also was a Moore, M. F. Moore. Born in Weakley, Tennessee, he enlisted in the Rangers for the first time on June 25, 1875 and served until May 31, 1877. Since he and George Moore were only four years different in age, they probably were brothers. Why both of them died the same year is not known. The number of Ranger graves increased to three with the burial of James Hampton Lane in 1887. The fourth burial came in 1893, followed five years later, in 1898, with the final burial of the 19th century.

During the first decade of the 20th century, 6 new graves were added, bringing the number of ex-rangers to 11. In the teens, another 5 burials occurred. With 2 deaths in 1920, the tombstone count for ex-Rangers in the cemetery had grown to 18. From 1921 to 1929, another 8 Rangers were interred there—the largest number of burials in any decade. The count had risen to 26. Only 3 burials occurred in the 1930s, followed by 3 more in the 1940s. Since 2003, 4 former Rangers of the modern era have been laid to rest in the Hill Country cemetery.

When Kerr County historians began planning for the historical marker dedication, then Senior Ranger Captain H.R. (Lefty) Block was asked to speak at the ceremonies. August 22, 1987 was a typical summer day, but those who attended the event saw something not many had seen before—almost an entire company of modern Texas Rangers on horseback. Nearly a hundred Rangers or retired Rangers attended the dedication. At the beginning of the ceremony, the present-day Rangers rode through the cemetery in an equestrian salute to their predecessors.

“The 32 one-time Texas Rangers who lie here don’t have much in common,” Block said in his speech. “They didn’t look alike, they went on to do different things after they left the Rangers, and they had different joys and different sorrows in life. But they were Texas Rangers and that did give them something in common, then and now.”
